Today's Gospel is very comforting for us Catholic Christians on many levels. The raising of Lazarus from the dead is a foreshadowing of what will happen to our Savior Jesus Christ on Easter Sunday. The Catholic

Church teaches us that one day our bodies and souls will be united with God in heaven. The raising of Lazarus gives us all hope of consolation and hope of rising.

The reaction of Jesus at the death of his friend Lazarus is also a source of consolation, especially when we too are grieving the loss of a loved one. We hear that Jesus was perturbed and deeply troubled. It states also that Jesus wept. We really need to pause and reflect on this for a moment on this Lenten journey as we carry our cross and try to follow in his footsteps. Jesus—the Son of God—wept at the news of the death of his friend. Jesus wept despite the fact that he is all knowing and all powerful. He wept even though he know he could raise Lazarus. This is quite remarkable and it can help us in our grief. So we often wonder, "WHY?" when someone dies, especially if it is a sudden death, a family member or a young person, we are shaken. So rather than hope for a miracle today or tomorrow, work on resolving a problem ourselves, with the confidence and serenity that God is with us through it all. It is called faith, and in it, taking up one's cross to follow Jesus as a witness and testimony of his presence in our lives.
