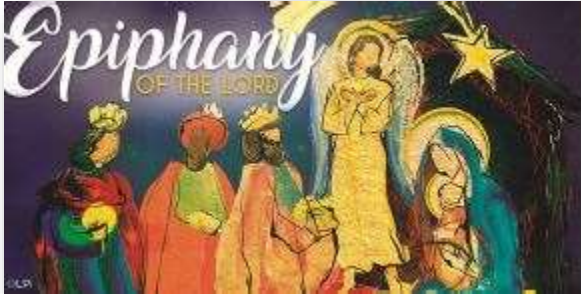




From the Desk of Father Peter
