

# Wise Prayer

Becoming king at somewhere between 12 and 14 years-old, Solomon realized he was young, inexperienced, and bore a heavy responsibility for a growing kingdom. He will regularly be called upon to make very difficult decisions, as will be the case in

just a few verses hence. In a dream, God reassures him. With wisdom beyond his years, he prays for an understanding heart, the ability to distinguish


right from wrong. Praying for the gifts needed to be of

service to others, rather than for selfish gain – a wise prayer in every age. If Solomon had prayed in this way every morning, how much differently things may have turned out! Sadly, he let the gift of wisdom go to his head, rather than his heart. There are definitely several lessons to take home.

# **Meditating on Torah**

The word 'law' doesn't do justice to how our Jewish brothers and sisters, and the psalmist of

Psalm 119 understand Torah. It is God's instruction so that we might have a fruitful, blessed and joyful life. What Psalm 119 lacks in plot,



it more than makes up in the countless ways it reflects on the value of God's instruction, God's law, God's Word. We just get a taste in today's responsorial psalm. With 176 verses, this acrostic psalm leaves not one stone left unturned!

# The Long View

Taken out of context, the claim "all things work for good for those who love God" can seem quite naïve. But put in the context of all St. Paul

writes about God's plan, and how Jews and Gentiles fit into it: that's a different story. St. Paul always seems able to take the long view. Thank God! It is in the long view that we can see how suffering led to glory for Christ, our risen savior, and how our suffering, united with his, can lead to glory and eternal life for us!

#### **A Few More Parables**

Jesus offers parables in this week's Gospel inviting us to consider just how precious the kingdom of God is. More to the point, the parables invite us to spend time pondering just how precious life can be when we live it in God's will and God's grace in the kingdom. Everything else pales in comparison. Discover the truth of what Jesus is teaching, and we will know just when to

cherish the old, and when to make room for the new. Very similar to the wisdom Solomon asked for!

Coming this Fall, 2023, St. John's will offer our parish RCIA Program led by Rick Paoletti and supported by our pastor, Fr. Peter. What is RCIA you may ask? RCIA is a process in which one discerns his/her desire to become a baptized and fully initiated member of the Catholic Church. RCIA is also a process for those who are already baptized Christians who are seeking to be received into full communion with the Catholic Church through the Sacraments of Confirmation and First Eucharist. Thirdly, RCIA is an opportunity for Catholics who are already fully initiated (Baptism, First Eucharist and Confirmation) in the Catholic Church who desire a deeper understanding of Catholic teachings.

By taking part in the RCIA program, one is not obligated to fulfill what the program's intended purpose is, however, it is our prayerful desire this will come to fruition. # First Reading 1 Kgs 3:5, 7-12

The LORD appeared to Solomon in a dream at night. God said, "Ask something of me and I will give it to you." Solomon answered:

"O LORD, my God, you have made me, your servant, king to succeed my father David; but I am a mere youth, not knowing at all how to act. I serve you in the midst of the people whom you have chosen, a people so vast that it cannot be numbered or counted. Give your servant, therefore, an understanding heart to judge your people and to distinguish right from wrong. For who is able to govern this vast people of yours?"

The LORD was pleased that Solomon made this request. So God said to him: "Because you have asked for this—not for a long life for yourself, nor for riches, nor for the life of your enemies, but for understanding so that you may know what is right—I do as you requested. I give you a heart so wise and understanding that there has never been anyone like you up to now, and after you there will come no one to equal you."

What is bad they throw away. Thus it will be at the end of the age. The angels will go out and separate the wicked from the righteous and throw them into the fiery furnace, where there will be wailing and grinding of teeth.

"Do you understand all these things?" They answered, "Yes."

And he replied, "Then every scribe who has been instructed in the kingdom of heaven is like the head of a household who brings from his storeroom both the new and the old."





### On August 4, the Church Celebrates the Feast Day of St. John Vianney, Patron of Priests

John Vianney, also known as the Holy Curé de Ars, was born May 8, 1786 in Dardilly, near Lyon, France to a family of farmers. He was ordained a priest in 1815 and became curate in Ecully. He was then sent to the remote French community of Ars in 1818 to be a parish priest.

Upon his arrival, the priest immediately began praying and working for the conversion of his parishioners. Although he saw himself as unworthy of his

mission as pastor, he allowed himself to be consumed by the love of God as he served the people.

Vianney slowly helped to revive the community's faith through both his prayers and the witness of his lifestyle. He gave powerful homilies on the mercy and love of God, and it is said that even staunch sinners were converted upon hearing him. In addition, he restored his church, formed an orphanage, "La Providence," and cared for the poor.

His reputation as a confessor grew rapidly, and pilgrims traveled from all over France to come to him in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Firmly committed to the conversion of the people, he would spend up to 16 hours a day in the confessional.

Plagued by many trials and besieged by the devil, St. John Vianney remained firm in his faith, and lived a life of devotion to God. Dedicated to the Blessed Sacrament, he spent much time in prayer and practiced much mortification. He lived on little food and sleep, while working without rest in unfailing humility, gentleness, patience and cheerfulness, until he was well into his 70s.

John Vianney died on August 4, 1859. Over 1,000 people attended his funeral, including the bishop and priests of the diocese, who already viewed his life as a model of priestly holiness.

The Holy Curé of Ars was canonized by Pope Pius XI in 1925. He is the patron of priests. Over 450,000 pilgrims travel to Ars every year in remembrance of his holy life.

In 2009, Pope Benedict XVI, commemorating the 150th anniversary of St. John Vianney's death, declared the Year for Priests. The Pope wrote a Letter to Clergy, encouraging all priests to look to the Curé of Ars as an example of dedication to one's priestly calling.

As we celebrate St. John Vianney, Patron of Priests, let us please take time each day to pray for all our priests using the following prayer or one you may already have.



# **A Prayer for Priests**

O loving Mother Mary, Mother of Priests, take to your heart your sons who are close to you because of their priestly ordination and because of the power which they have received to carry on the work of Christ in a world which needs them so much.

Be their comfort, be their joy, be their strength, and especially help them to live and to defend the ideals of consecrated celibacy.

Lord Jesus, we your people pray to You for our priests. You have given them to us for OUR needs. We pray for them in THEIR needs.

We know that You have made them priests in the likeness of your own priesthood. You have consecrated them, set them aside, anointed them, filled them with the Holy Spirit, appointed them to teach, to preach, to minister, to console, to forgive, and to feed us with Your Body and Blood.

Yet we know, too, that they are one with us and share our human weaknesses. We know too that they are tempted to sin and discouragement as are we, needing to be ministered to, as do we, to be consoled and forgiven, as do we.

Indeed, we thank You for choosing them from among us, so that they understand us as we understand them, suffer with us and rejoice with us, worry with us and trust with us, share our beings, our lives, our faith.

We ask that You give them this day the gift You gave Your chosen ones on the way to Emmaus: Your presence in their hearts, Your holiness in their souls, Your joy in their spirits. And let them see You face to face in the breaking of the Eucharistic bread. We pray to You, O Lord, through Mary the mother

We pray to You, O Lord, through Mary the mother of all priests, for Your priests and for ours.


Note: For pastoral reasons, we respectfully ask that you do not leave any books or materials on the book rack that did not originate from this library. Thank you.
