

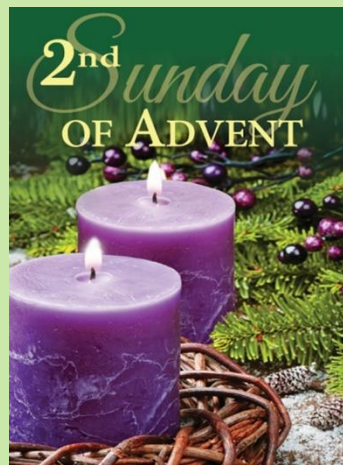


*From the Desk of Father Peter*
