We are Invited to Embrace the Light of Christ



What would it have been like to live while Jesus walked the earth? What if we could see Him face-to-face, hear His voice, touch Him and walk with Him. What if we were with Him when he made the blind see or the lame walk, cured the lepers or raised a dead man back to life? How would we have reacted? It is tempting to think that we would have been His disciples, that we surely would have seen His power and holiness and have believed in Him. How could it be otherwise? It would be obvious that this was, indeed, the Son of God—or would it?

Perhaps His very humanness would have been a stumbling block? Perhaps we would have found it difficult to see past this rather ordinary human being who dressed simply, likely spoke with the accent of His Galilean countrymen, walked the same hard ground that we walked and, like us, grew hungry and thirsty and tired.
