Fr Ring Breaks Down Scripture

Where to Look

God can break into our awareness in countless ways. Our 1st reading this weekend names two ends of the spectrum. At the mountain of God in the desert, when God delivered the commandments, Moses and Elijah's ancestors experienced God's presence in powerful, dramatic signs. Yet for Elijah, while there was a powerful, crushing wind, followed by an earthquake, it was the tiny, whispering sound, the sound of sheer silence, the calm in the midst of the storm through which God spoke. That silent, divine

presence lifted Elijah's fear and depression, putting him back on his feet. Between those two ends of the spectrum, there are countless ways God can reach out to us; dramatic events, or the most ordinary aspects of our daily life. More on drama, read I Kings 18-19. For the quiet ways, pray psalm 131 slowly and prayerfully.

Speaking of Drama

In the letter to the Romans, St. Paul wrestles with how so many of his beloved Jewish brothers and sisters could reject Christ. Do they still fit in God's plan? How? Lest those he wrote to think it just an academic exercise, he

Makes his passion for his people clear in our second reading. Then he lists all that is theirs. A prayer in the Good Friday Intercessions was changed in 1970, better acknowledging all that God has given to Paul's kindred, our brothers and sisters of the Jewish faith: "...for the Jewish people, the first to hear the word of God, that they may continue to grow in the love of his name and faithfulness to his covenant."

Walking on Water

Not unlike the first reading, in our Gospel we have a fierce storm, followed by a reassuring calm. Yes, that is life. The Gospel also offers another vivid picture. Peter with strong faith and courage, eyes

fixed on Jesus, ready to jump out of the boat and come to Jesus. He did walk on water! Next we see the other part of Peter, taking his eyes off Jesus, focusing instead on the surging waves, fearful he might drown. By God's grace, as he faltered and began to sink, he knew what to do: Call out for help, "Lord, save me!" Lord, help us to have courage to step out in faith. When we faulter, when we are sinking, help us to remember to call out for help. Then help us realize that the hand that reaches out to lift us may be a friend or family member who you have sent. Finally, help us to discover as well that sometimes you want us to be the hand that reaches out to someone who is drowning.

We Are Very Grateful, Fr. Ring

With the anticipated return of Fr. Peter before long, your time with us, Fr. Ring, is winding down and we take this opportunity to say *THANK YOU* and *WE ARE BLESSED* for your ministry to us. While we have missed Fr. Peter, it has been a delight having you here with us over these past several weeks.

We know there are many challenges our priests face day to day, especially in light of the priest shortage

here in our diocese, and for you to help Father Peter over this period of time so that he could return home for a much needed period of rest and renewal is truly a gift to Fr. Peter as well as to all of us. Please know how grateful we are for you bringing us the gift of The Eucharist in the holy sacrifice of the Mass, the Sacrament of Reconciliation and when the need arose, the Mass of Christian Burial—whatever our needs, you fulfilled them with a loving heart.

We look forward to you visiting us again, Fr. Ring, here at our beloved St. John's and until then, we offer our prayers for you for peace, spiritual well-being, happiness and good health. *In gratitude*





Gospel Mt 14:22-33

After he had fed the people, Jesus made the disciples get into a boat and precede him to the other side, while he dismissed the crowds. After doing so, he went up on the mountain by himself to pray. When it was evening he was there alone. Meanwhile the boat, already a few miles offshore, was being tossed about by the waves, for the wind was against it. During the fourth watch of the night, he came toward them walking on the sea. When the disciples saw him walking on the sea they were terrified. "It is a ghost," they said, and they cried out in fear. At once Jesus spoke to them, "Take courage, it is I; do not be afraid."

God and the Good Strong Wind

My only real memory of the Mackinac Island ferry was the physical sensation of the wind against my face. I remember, distinctly, that it hurt.

It surprised and confused me because wind had never felt painful before. Looking back now, I realize that it wasn't just the wind but the spray from the waves that crashed against the side of the ferry — that was what produced the sharp, biting sensation on my skin. But I couldn't have known that then, because my eyes were clamped shut. I refused to open them, even if I had, I would not have seen much, because my long hair was blown straight across my face.

I was four years old, and it was, in the immortal words of Winnie-the-Pooh, a very blustery day as my family made our way to Mackinac Island. I remember thinking I was going to die. I'm positive now that it wasn't really all that dramatic, but at four years old, you're awfully scared of a good strong wind.

Deep inside, aren't we all, really?

I think of the apostles who cannot recognize Christ — their friend — because he is doing something new. Something impossible. They are so sure he is a ghost, a sinister thing — children are always frightened of what they cannot understand.

And even when he reassures them, still Peter is not convinced. He demands, essentially, a miracle. He demands that Christ make him do what only Christ can do.

And even when the miracle takes place — he walks on water, he defies physics — still he is human. Scared, doubtful, distractible. No match for a good strong wind.

Pastoral Planning: Sharing Our Reality —School Enrollment

We are blessed to have two Catholic schools at Holy Cross and St. Lawrence. Holy Cross School

includes preschool through grade 6, while St. Lawrence contains classes from preschool through grade 5. During the 2022-2023 school year, 374 children received their education and had their faith enriched through these schools—216 at Holy Cross and 158 at St. Lawrence. Examples of Our FaithBlessed Fr. Michael Joseph McGivney

Michael Joseph McGivney was born on August 12, 1852, the first child of Irish immigrant parents in Waterbury, Connecticut. Blessed Father Michael Joseph McGivney was a diocesan priest. It was during



the time of his first assignment at St. Mary's Parish in New Haven that McGivney envisioned the need for a Catholic mutual aid society. His intention was to create an institution where Catholic men could provide financial security to families in need who had lost their primary breadwinner. Together with men from his church, he founded what is now the world's largest Catholic fraternal service organization — the **Knights of Columbus**.
