Nothing is Too Big for God

If you were to read the editorial pages of any newspapers in the country today, one would find a variety of opinions about many issues. Not everyone thinks the same way. The various opinions usually depend on the culture,

religious traditions or politics of the people in an area. The same can be said about us Christians; we represent diverse groups of people. While we are many people, we are all one in Christ. However, as with us Christians, there are different spiritual ways to arrive at a place God wants us to be. Remember, like reading editorials, every day we are free to choose the attitude we will bring as Christians. This story that someone told me over ten years ago is a blessing and a lesson for all of us.

"Two men went fishing. One was an experienced fisherman, the other wasn't. Every time the experienced fisherman caught a big fish, he put it in his ice chest to keep it fresh. Whenever the inexperienced fisherman caught a big fish, he threw it back in the water. The experienced fisherman watched this go on all day and finally got tired of seeing this man waste such good fish. 'Why do you keep throwing back all the big fish you catch?' he asked. The inexperienced fisherman replied, 'I only have a small frying pan.' Such was his intention."

Sometimes, like that fisherman, we throw back



the big plans, big dreams, big jobs, great opportunities that God gives us.

Our faith is too small. We laugh at that fisherman who didn't figure out that all he needed was a bigger frying pan;' yet how ready are we to increase the size of our faith? What specific effort do we take in

that direction? How is our church important to us in our everyday outlook of things? How do we grow in the faith? We should not be afraid to be open and vulnerable to the Holy Spirit working in us. If we do, we will see God's power more clearly and readily invite him into our hearts. Each of us is called to be a disciple of prayer. Each of us is called to be a disciple of charity, willfully giving of our time, talent, and treasure to support the Church. Each of us is called to be a disciple of welcome to the holy people who come to us, who are sent by God, to lead, challenge and call the world to Christ. One thing that everybody in the world wants and needs is friendliness. It is by our work and support that we, ourselves, are active and vibrant in the ministry of the Church. Whether it's a problem or a possibility, God will never give us anything bigger than we can handle. That means we can confidently walk into anything God brings our way. We can do all



things through Christ. Phil 3:13. Nothing is too big for God. God Bless You All.

He fully understood God had a plan for him, as He does for each of us, and Bob accepted the crosses he was asked to carry; he trusted in God's love and mercy. With God watching over him and with his devoted wife, Millie, always by his side, Bob persevered through the adversities of life with grace and courage.

Introductory Prayer: Fr Peter **Collections and Attendance:**

- Attendance is up slightly over the previous 12 months.
- Good attendance at Daily Mass.
- All things considered; collections have held up well.
- Note: 3 significant donors passed away during the past year.

2024 – 25 Budget: <u>Unanimously approved</u> after discussion of details:

Profit/Loss -

- Good discussion of detailed revenue and expenses.
- Sunday Collections budget was increased from \$486,000 to \$494,000 to reflect actuals for the previous year, even though we lost 3 significant donors.

Other income:

- Revenue from Fish Fry was up from the previous year.
- Had interest income from Bank CD and Money Market Acct which we did not have most of the previous year.
- Gift income was down some for FY 23-24, but this is always very difficult to budget.
- Commnunis Funds were good, but this is in the "non-operating Revenue" category. Note: Communis Funds are the 2 Parish Investment Accts managed by the Diocese.

Budgeted Expenses:

- Salaries expense increased 18% due to \$25,000 error in budgeting Pension costs in Fiscal Year 2023-2024.
- Diocesan Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) is set at 4%
- School Subsidy assessment for FY2024-2025 has <u>decreased</u> \$2,000. This is calculated at 14% of 3-year average of "regular" Parish Collections (these are the 3 main revenue accts for which we have budgeted \$494,000 in FY2024-2025).
- Snow Removal big item; budgeted at \$25,000. It
 consists of 3 fixed contractual payments + variable per
 trip costs and material costs for salting and shoveling
 which increase the cost. We are at the mercy of the
 weather in this category.

Possible improvement projects for FY 2024-2025:

- Concrete facing at front of Church would require Building Restoration experts; est. cost \$5,000,
- A new A/C unit for Parish Ctr; est cost \$25,000.
- Repairs to Glass Silo over Altar

Continued Possible improvement projects for FY 2024-2025:

- Replace carpeting in Church
- · Fundraising might be needed.
- Significant expenditures require Diocesan involvement.

Overall Budget Summary:

\$ 627,950 = Budgeted Revenue from Operations

\$ 627,874 = Budgeted Operating Expenses

\$ 76 = Budgeted Net Profit from Operations

0 Budgeted Non-operating Revenue

47,000 = Budgeted Non-operating Expenses (repairs to Church)

(\$ 46,924) = Budgeted Overall Net Loss for FY 24-25

Review May 31st, 2024

YTD Financial Results for the period 7/1/23 - 5/31/24:

Balance Sheet:

SJ Parish continues to have a strong Balance Sheet due to:

- Fiscal discipline regarding expenditures.
- two interest-bearing accts: a 5% CD and an approx.
 4% Money Mkt Acct.
- Solid returns on Diocesan Communis Accounts.

Profit/Loss:

- We had a (\$36,394) net <u>loss</u> from Operations so far from 7/1/23 – 5/31/24.
- Contributing to this was a \$25,000 error in budgeting too little for Pension costs for the year.
- We had solid \$90,958 in <u>Net Non-operating</u> revenue (after Expenses) due to very good investment returns on our 2 Communis Accts + the interest-bearing Bank CD + Money Mkt accounts.
- There was a good discussion around certain expenses which stood out as a bit high i.e., Snow Removal & Salting.
- Net result = \$54,564 NET overall income

Buildings and Grounds Update:

- Parish Center Heating/Cooling had some issues with one of the existing A/C units and we have asked vendors for quotes on a new unit.
- The Parking lot was sealed and striped on June 17/18;
 cost = \$20,000. We decided to post this expense to FY 2023-2024
- Church cooling recently Crosby/Brownlee (with whom we have a Maintenance Contract) replaced the Air Drier unit which removes moisture from the air lines which run to the Air Handlers. This ensures we can continue to cool the Church.
- (Possible) Carpet replacement no discussion
- (Possible) repairs to stucco in front wall of Church no discussion.

Other Business:

- Next Finance Council meeting is scheduled for 10/2/24.
- That meeting will be our Annual Corporate Meeting at which the Council must certify certain aspects of our operations for the Diocese.
- Nick Verdino will bring the financial summaries from today's meeting to the Parish Council.
- Fr. Robert Ring will replace Fr. Peter during his August / September trip to Ghana.

Pastoral Planning: Task Force Update

The Charlotte/Greece/Hilton Pastoral Planning Task Force met on July 9 with Bishop Matano who graciously accepted our invitation. The Task Force was

also joined by Fr. Daniel White, Priest Secretary to Bishop Matano, and Mr. Michael Sauter, Diocesan Director of the Department of Pastoral Services. The primary question posed to Bishop Matano was "are we on the right track with our pastoral planning efforts, including those of the task force and the three 7-parish committees (evangelization, vocations, and shared website)? Bishop Matano said that any pastoral efforts should include attention to increasing Mass attendance, support for family life and Catholic education (including catechesis of parents), and offering increased opportunities for the sacrament of Confession. Evangelization begins with building relationships—first with Jesus Christ and then with each other. There needs to be a welcoming embrace from the Church and a preferential option for the poor. Vocations to the priesthood are very important; seminarians from our Diocese this fall will include a young man from St. Mark's Parish. Bishop Matano asked these seven parishes to do our best to remove siloes by developing cooperation, holding common events, and sharing staff and ministries. The Bishop's concluding words: I have deep gratitude for the work you are doing. Do not get discouraged; there are many good things happening. You are volunteering your time and putting so much effort into this work. This is the strength of our parishes.

Our Blessed Mother shows us how the way we live today can prepare us, in hope, to also enter into heavenly glory at the end of our lives. Are we open to God's precious gift of new life? How do we support pregnant mothers and parents? Do we prioritize showing our love to those who are ill or aging? Do we care for them in a way that respects God's gift of life?

Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.
