Lent is about us and our journey of faith. It is about God and us. It is a time of renewal to fast, pray and give alms. We are invited to draw from the source of our baptism, the grace within and allow Christ to revive us.

#### **Remember:**

- 1. Prayer is not ONLY a "spare wheel" that we pull out when in trouble; it is a "steering wheel" that directs us in the right path throughout life. So pray always.
- 2. Why is a car's windshield so large and the rearview mirror so small? Because our past is not as important as our future. So look ahead and move on in your trust of God. Note our mistakes, change our ways, and trust in God.
- 3. Friendship is like a book. It takes a few

#### Not As Man Sees

I don't know Fr. Stu personally, but I've heard a fair number of his homilies. I think it is safe to assume that if he and I were to get into a discussion on any number of things, from church history to liturgical music to stand-up comedy, each of us would cringe

at the opinions of the other.

But Fr. Stu happens to offer just about the only confession time within 20 miles of me that consistently works with my schedule. That means that, quite by accident, Fr. Stu is my regular confessor. For years now, he's sat patiently on the other side of the grille, listening to me pour out the details of my transgressions, from the pathetic to the embarrassing, and he absolves me of my sins.

Christ links vision with humility and pride with blindness In the Gospel, Christ links vision with humility and pride with blindness. We see again and again in Scripture how God de-

lights in surprising us, in revealing himself through people, places, and experiences we not only didn't expect but perhaps had totally written off.

We are right to be proud of the truth, but we are wrong if the truth causes us to be proud of ourselves. The truth no more belongs to the one who believes it than sight belongs to the blind man in the Gospel. A gift does not reflect on the recipient. It reflects on the giver.

After a great deal of thought, I've decided to be grateful that God contrived to give me a confessor whom I strongly disagree with on so many things. It's a powerful reminder of how much I must receive from other people, even those I may think are wrong. In that confessional, Fr. Stu is only a priest, and I am only a sinner.

#### Pastoral Planning: Sharing Our Reality—Parishes & Geography of the Diocese of Rochester

Currently the Diocese of Rochester has 86 parishes

within 12 counties stretching from Lake Ontario south to the PA border and from Brockport to Auburn. Only 28 of these are stand-alone parishes like St. Lawrence or St. Leo. Twenty-three are parishes with multiple (2-4) churches each, created from previously separate parishes that have been merged—e.g. St. Kateri in Irondequoit. Thirty-five, like Holy Cross and Our Mother of Sorrows, are parishes that share their leader/priest(s) with one or two other parishes. #### NO To Doctor-Assisted Suicide. Please speak up now.

Proponents of doctor-assisted suicide are pressing state leaders to legalize this deadly practice in New York State, and lawmakers need to hear from us if we hope to avoid another assault on human life. Assisted suicide is dangerous for patients, caregivers, and vulnerable populations such as the elderly and people with disabilities. Suicide is not medical care. Please tell your State Senate and Assembly representative that you oppose this dangerous and deadly practice. **Contact your state legislators now! Email or call – here is our message:** 

As your constituent, I urge you to oppose any legislation that would legalize doctor-assisted suicide, which may be labeled "medical aid-in-dying". I believe this practice would violate the physician's oath to heal and comfort their patients, and to do no harm. Death is not a medical treatment. Vote "no" on S2445/A995.

This bill (S2445/A995) is particularly dangerous for some of the most vulnerable citizens of our state: the elderly, the poor, the under-insured, people in medically underserved communities, people with depression, and people living with disabilities. Such individuals could be pressured into choosing death over life by health insurance decisions to fund only the least costly treatment; by family members feeling overburdened or even those wishing to exploit their loved ones; by medical professionals who may subtly make judgments about whose lives are worth living. A state policy of physician-assisted suicide can only lead to coercion and abuse. Sign your name and address.
