



More than sixteen years ago, a friend of mine sent me this story about the CROSS. It is thoughtprovoking as it presents us with God's grace which is free. The story goes like this:

A young man, at the end of his rope and seeing no way out, dropped to his knees in prayer. "Lord, I can't go on," he said. "I have too heavy a cross to bear." The Lord replied, "My son, if you can't bear its weight, just place your cross inside this room. Then open that other door and pick out any cross



you wish." The man was filled with relief and said, "Thank you Lord," and did as he was told. Upon entering the other door, he saw many crosses, some so large the tops were not even visible. Then he spotted a tiny cross leaning against a far wall. "I'd like that one, Lord," he whispered.

And the Lord replied, "My son, that is the cross you just brought in."

When life's problems seem overwhelming, it helps to look around and see what other people are coping with. You may consider yourself far more fortunate than you imagined. YOUR CROSS, whatever your cross, whatever your pain, will always be followed by sunshine after the rain. Perhaps you may stumble, perhaps you may even fall, but God is always there to help you through it all in PRAYER. May God give you the strength to bear whatever Cross is yours in prayer. According to St Paul, faith creates a desire for God and a longing to be with him. This desire for God is the reason why people choose to "walk by faith, not by sight," even when walking

by "sight" seems so much easier. 2 Corinthians 5:27.



Our Mass Book will open via telephone beginning THIS Wednesday, November 16, 2022, for those who will like to schedule Masses during the months of January through April, 2023. Please call the Parish Office at (585)225-8980 on November 16 between 9:00 AM and Noon and 2:00 PM 'til 4:30 PM. After November 16, you can call during regular office hours. We are not accepting scheduling requests before November 16. Each Mass stipend is \$10 and we will continue to follow the scheduling guidelines that have been in place.

Sanctuary Candle Scheduling for 2023 will begin via telephone (585-225-8980) starting Wednesday, November **30. 2022.** We are blessed with 4 Sanctuary Candles – two red candles on either side of the Tabernacle and two blue candles on either side of the Marian Shrine. These candles burn for a week from Saturday thru Friday. You can reserve these candles in memory of a loved one, in honor of someone, or in honor of a special occasion (birthday, wedding, anniversary). Reserving for multiple family members in the same week is also a nice idea. Each Candle stipend is \$10. If you are reserving for someone who has recently passed on, please let us know and we can, with enough notice, prepare a card for you to present to the family of the deceased letting them know about the candle that will burn in their loved one's memory, and that our parish family will remember him/her in our prayers during that week.

Chairperson's Comments:

- Coffee Hours We still need a ministry to Host the Month of May coffee hour. The December coffee hour date has been moved to December 18, 2022
- Council Member Update Karen Bessette has graciously accepted the secretary position. We need to fill the open council position now that Christine Paoletii has moved to Cleveland. Please provide me with names of people in our parish that you think would be a good candidate for our council. Father will review the names and have the final approval.
- CMA Update Our goal this year is \$83,000 which is \$1,111 higher than last year. Our average donation so far this year is \$186.00. We have lost 51 parishioners since last year. Our parishioners may need to up their donation a little bit more this year for us to make our goal. Please talk up the CMA and encourage the importance of their donations.
- Lawn Care We have 4 parishioners who care for the lawn, this includes mowing the grass and weed whacking. Hours of time go into this weekly. One week this summer 2 of the volunteers were not available, and the extra work was a lot for 2 people. This leads me to believe that each of our ministries should have a co-chair or a back up person in case the point person should not be available.

Fr. Peter's Update:

I would like to thank all of you for the support of the parish while I was away. I was able to view the photos online of our first coffee hour and I appreciate you keeping me informed. I was sad to hear when I returned that Christine was moving to Cleveland. She will be missed very much and I pray for her to be a shining light in her new parish.

I am trying to decide when it is a good time to do an Adoration for the Eucharistic Revival. I am thinking of ideas to incorporate into the adoration such as music, we could sing traditional songs about the Eucharist from the old hymnals. I am also looking for priests from other parishes to come to St. John's to talk to us about the Eucharist. We need to pray and evangelize across the United States per the USCCB. We need to energize our faith, encourage our young people, and pray for the Catholic Church. We need parishioners to step it up and be there for each other. Together we can make it happen.

St John's has seen great things happen in our church. We currently are looking into the skylight that has been

leaking. I am also very pleased that the repairs on the roof worked, and we have not had any more leaks.

Faith in Action Committee: Marcia Parsons - There are 5 members in this ministry that include herself, Rick Paoletti, Kathy Paoletti, Jill Finan and Eileen Zegarelli. A Rosary workshop was held on Wednesday October 12. 11 people attended and there was very positive feedback. The new practice of praying the rosary ½ hour before each Mass began this past weekend and there were 7 parishioners for the 4:00 PM Mass, 10 for the 8:00 AM Mass and 11 for the 10:00 AM Mass. The committee is hoping these numbers will grow.

Arts and Environment: Marcia Parsons (in Patty Hoag's Absence) – Patty Hoag and Marcia have met once, and they are trying to get a baseline on what is required for preparing the church for different celebrations. Patty is the leader of this ministry and is currently working on recruiting new members, both men and women, to work alongside those who have been decorating in previous years.

Certificates of Appreciation: Sharon Miller – There are three certificates that are ready to be presented.

Liturgy Committee: Tod Simone – All Saints Day, November 1 there will be a 9:00 AM and 12:05 PM Mass. The Annual Memorial Mass for deceased parishioners will be on Saturday, November 5 at 10:00 AM. Thanksgiving Day Mass will be at 9:00 AM. The Word Among Us books have been ordered for Advent. Effective the first weekend of Advent the baskets will return and be passed for collection. The donation boxes will be removed.

Pastoral Ministry/Homebound Outreach Update: Tod Simone – The hospitals have lifted their restrictions and clergy can now visit a parishioner any time during the day, which makes visitations much easier.

Knights of Columbus Council 3892 Update: Rick Paoletti – The 40 days for life campaign is going on now. The ultrasound van has been a huge success and has saved 20 babies. Marcia mentioned that Father Jim Hewes recently shared with her that since the ultrasound van has been in use for about a year now, 20 women have decided to choose life for their babies and not proceed with an abortion. One of the moms who chose life for her baby brought the baby back to the van to show the volunteers her new baby. The Knights will be having a memorial Mass for deceased members on Sunday, November 6 at St. John's.
