



Feast of Christ, the King of the Universe

As the month of November winds down, so too is the Church's liturgical calendar. This weekend we celebrate the Feast of Christ the King. Today, Jesus continues and reaffirms his message that he is to be found among the poor and suffering—and he continues to suffer in them. Jesus tells

us we should show our love for those in need. This love isn't just expressed in words, but also in concrete actions. On this Feast of Christ the King, we are invited to pledge our loyalty to Jesus, the image of our all-compassionate God. He is our king, whose symbol of kingship is the Cross. Soon we will begin a new liturgical year with the blessed season of Advent. During these final days of the Church year, the readings often challenge us to reflect about the last things; that is, the winding down of life itself and our need to be prepared to stand before Jesus one day and give an account of our lives.

In the course of this week we will also celebrate Thanksgiving.



The Diocesan Catholic Ministries Appeal Continues. The goal for St. John's is \$83,000.

As of Tuesday, November 8, 180 households have pledged \$37,941, taking us to 45.71% of our goal.

To Our Donors and to Those from Whom We are Waiting to Hear

As indicated by the numbers above, there has been a fair amount of activity in CMA donations within our parish and we are grateful to those who have given generously. For those who have not yet contributed, we need everyone's support and hope that you will discern your appropriate level of support.

To consider your level of giving, first PRAY about it and then take a moment to reflect on what you gave last year. Ask yourself if there's any way you can increase that amount. Many times we will find it is possible to offer an increased donation. Consider for a moment where we spend our money for the smaller things. If we were to forego our daily/weekly/monthly "simple pleasures", we might be surprised how the savings add up, allowing for that increase in giving this year.

Your pledge is due by the end of December. However, we remind you that payment of your pledge is due at the end of May, 2023—appx 6½ months from now. This means you can break down that pledge into 6 equal payments, making it a little easier for you complete payment of your pledge.

The deeper issue is not really about the money, but our faith and the participation that flows from it. So, you are invited to consider ways you can respond with a grateful heart. In living this way, we demonstrate — "God is with Us Always."

Sunday, November 20 The Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, Ling of the Universe

First Reading 2 Sm 5:1-3

In those days, all the tribes of Israel came to David in Hebron and said: "Here we are, your bone and your flesh. In days past, when Saul was our king, it was you who led the Israelites out and brought them back. And the LORD said to you, 'You shall shepherd my people Israel and shall be commander of Israel."

He is the image of the invisible God, the firstborn of all creation. For in him were created all things in heaven and on earth, the visible and the invisible, whether thrones or dominions or principalities or powers; all things were created through him and for him. He is before all things, and in him all things hold together. He is the head of the body, the church. He is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, that in all things he himself might be preeminent. For in him all the fullness was pleased to dwell, and through him to reconcile all things for him, making peace by the blood of his cross through him, whether those on earth or those in heaven.

Gospel Lk 23:35-43

The rulers sneered at Jesus and said, "He saved others, let him save himself if he is the chosen one, the Christ of God." Even the soldiers jeered at him. As they approached to offer him wine they called out, "If you are King of the Jews, save yourself." Above him there was an inscription that read, "This is the King of the Jews."

Now one of the criminals hanging there reviled Jesus, saying, "Are you not the Christ? Save yourself and us." The other, however, rebuking him, said in reply, "Have you no fear of God, for you are subject to the same condemnation? And indeed, we have been condemned justly, for the sentence we received corresponds to our crimes, but this man has done nothing criminal." Then he said, "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom." He replied to him, "Amen, I say to you, today you will be with me in Paradise."


Our Collection Baskets Are Returning

It was brought to our attention recently that some people were not aware of our ongoing practice of praying the Rosary before each weekend Mass. In cooperation with our Blessed Mother's direction at Fatima in 1917 to pray the Rosary daily, we continue to pray the Rosary beginning ½ hour prior to each weekend Mass. We gather in the pews in front of the Tabernacle and we invite more people to join us. If you're a beginner, no worries as we can offer you guidance as you become more familiar with this most beautiful prayer.

We find our world, our nation, our communities, and sometimes our homes in the midst of turbulent times, so all the more reason to get on our knees and pray to our dear Mother for her powerful intercession for peace in the world, an end to abortion, vocations to the Holy Priesthood, our families, and our own personal intentions. For those who need a Rosary and/or pamphlet on how to pray the Rosary, we have them available.
